
Table Topic: The Future of the Fact Book



Fact Book: a reference guide which contains charts and tables of institutional information on a variety of topics, generally including detailed data on students, faculty, staff, courses, financials, and more.

Pros and Cons - Print vs. Electronic Fact Books

Printed Fact Books

Advantages:

- Tangible historical record
- Information is portable (not tied to computer)
- Campus familiarity with print format

Disadvantages:

- Information can be outdated before it goes to print
- Distributed selectively (often only to on campus audiences)
- Waiting on information for one section can delay publication of the entire document
- Errors discovered after printing cannot be corrected
- Time required for document layout
- Cost of printing

Electronic Fact Books

Advantages:

- People expect information to be accessible online
- Information is more timely
- Information can be updated as necessary or uploaded in sections as data becomes available
- Document is available to anyone with internet access (prospective students, peers, etc.)
- Interactive can be linked to additional data (drill down features) not available in print
- No cost for distribution/printing

Disadvantages:

- No hard copy for historical documentation
- Reconstruction for assessment purposes can be difficult (broken links, missing documents)
- Campus users may be resistant to changing formats
